To highlight the integral role of conferences in the academic milieu, the Boettcher Foundation Endowment for Distinctive Educational Programming has provided \$100,000 in seed funding to establish the **Professional and Academic Conference Endowment (PACE)**—which supports preparation, travel, and presentation at professional conferences for all CU-Boulder undergraduates. The Boettcher Foundation has asked us to raise \$25,000 in matching funds from Boettcher Scholar alumni to help this endowment meet its ultimate goal. 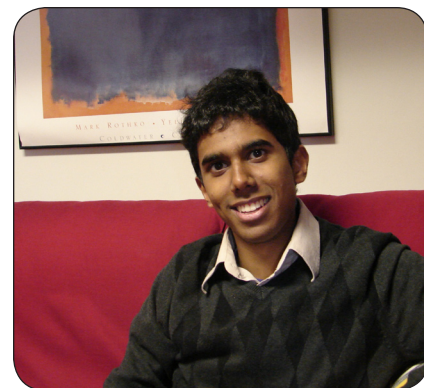
You can help. By increasing CU-Boulder's ability to provide enriching conference experiences, you'll assist undergraduates in:

With our recent graduates now competing with midcareer professionals transitioning due to economic turbulence, CU-Boulder undergraduates increasingly need to gain experience beyond the classroom in order to compete.
